Living Easter

Have you heard the story of the worship leader who overslept and failed to show up for the Easter Sunrise Service at the church where he worked? The next year, the pastor of the church called the worship leader on Easter morning at 4am saying "Jesus has risen! You had better too!"

I remember the first Easter Sunday I realized that Jesus was alive. It wasn't as powerful as the disciples' realization but for me, it was close

I was a young adult, working on the staff of Young Life in Orange County. We had worked hard to get the kids excited about going to camp, finding resources to help them get there with very little success. It had kind of a negative impact on me as I was beginning to think that God had not called me to this ministry.

Then Easter!

I was in my little office that was so small that "if I sneezed I caught my own cold", and I heard some noise outside. We were going to have a Young Life Club that evening in the big room outside my office, and the leaders were moving chairs from other rooms into the big room. I was surprised because we had never had that many kids at "club" and I was nervous that something else was scheduled in the room that was assigned to us. I asked, "What are you doing?"

One leader stopped moving chairs to say, "Roxanne, you only get one shot at these kids, don't screw it up!" Then he went back to moving the chairs.

But I would have messed things up if Jesus had not showed up! After the "chair guy" left, I started thinking about Easter and about a dead man getting out of a grave, and, maybe for the first time in my life, it hit me that Jesus was alive! And not only was He alive, He was right there in that little office and would be there at the club meeting when I

shared with those teenagers...many more than ever before!

That changed everything, and still does. There is something about Easter that makes a bad day good, a human wish for something better, and the sinful hopeful. "And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith....then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ are lost. If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied." 1 Corinthians 15: 14, 18-19 (NIV)

That's why I like Easter. It's that time of year when I can sit back with my diet coke and review the basics...uh basic...that a cold, dead corpse got out of a grave and said I could, too.

Jesus says to the prostitute in Luke 7 that her sins were forgiven. He says that to us also. If we're forgiven, we're free. If we're free, we're His, and that changes everything. I don't have to be driven by guilt or shame. After the husband's death. a police officer questions the psychiatrist, implying that it might be in the best interest of the doctor to testify against his patient because ultimately, "someone is going to have to pay for this death."

If you enjoy a good mystery, you'll probably enjoy the well-constructed script, competent direction and entertaining performances in the film (including a slightly campy turn by Catherine Zeta Jones as another psychiatrist). But for now, I'd like to dwell a bit on the concept of responsibility.

Medical science has proven that many aspects of our personalities, our emotional actions and reactions, and Should we be held responsible for our actions if we are just tossed to and fro by hormones, dopamine and adrenaline?

lifestyle choices could be driven by our bodies' chemistry. In the film, many characters turn to pills to help cope with depression, anxiety, sleeplessness, and a variety of other human ills.

If body chemistry drives our emotions, attitudes, and even our actions, are we truly responsible for what we do? Questions of chemistry stray into questions of ethics, spirituality and even theology.

Should we be held responsible for our actions if we are just tossed to and fro by hormones, dopamine and adrenaline? Or does environment controls us as much as heredity? Surely, if God is there, He can't blame us for acting as we do. He made us this way.

Centuries before we had the physiological understanding we have today, the writers of Scripture acknowledged we are often creatures driven by forces that seem beyond our control. The Apostle Paul wrote in Romans 7:15, "I do not understand what I do. For what I want to do I do not do, but what I hate I do." (NIV)

Ultimately, Paul acknowledges his own responsibility for his actions, and acknowledges that someone must pay the price. It is there that God's plot twist comes to bear, for Paul wrote in I Timothy 1:15, "Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners – of whom I am the worst." (NIV again)

We live in a fallen world, and we have trouble enough figuring out our own motivations -- let alone the motivations of others. But ultimately God provides the cure we need – with only beneficial side effects.

A Challenging Situation

Some schools in the California State School system (incuding Sonoma State) are derecognizing their InterVarsity chapters. The situation arises as a result of a Supreme Court decision a few years ago and the strict enforcement of a recent executive order intended to ensure nondiscrimination in leadership and membership in clubs on CSU campuses.

Since InterVarsity's constitution requires all student leaders in a chapter to sign a statement of faith, IV has been targeted in particular. There are several reasons we feel compelled to stand by our leadership requirements:

- 1) leadership requirements are required by Scripture and are consistent with 2000 years of church teaching
- 2) our leadership standards describe necessary skill requirements for our leaders to accomplish their tasks
- 3) many colleges, including the Ohio State system, Florida's state university system, UT-Austin, University of Minnesota, etc., explicitly permit religious groups to use religious criteria in leadership selection
- 4) we desire to have diversity and tolerance on college campuses which would enable and make room for differing viewpoints and opinions.

InterVarsity is appealing this reading of the non-discrimination rules for all religious clubs and organizations on CSU campuses.

Sonoma State fellowship's student president and the staff team leader met with a campus administrator, who was gracious and positive towards the club and is going to keep IV recognized for the rest of this semester while the appeal process continues to play out. Also, the President of IV and others from the legal team have been connecting with the Cal State School system higher ups and building partnerships with other college religious organizations that can stand with us.

Right now the most important thing you can do is pray. Pray for the Cal State School system leaders, pray for IV's President and legal team, and pray that our fellowship will grow even stronger during this mild persecution.

Please don't respond strongly to the State system, or with social media posts. There may be a time and a place for that in the future, but right now IV's national leadership is trying to gracefully solve things before it needs to get taken to that next level.

Encouraging News

Our chapter was selected to take part in a Chapter Building program that runs for 18 months and gives us a growth coach. Since starting the program this semester, we've experienced unprecedented growth.

Normally in the spring semester, older students focus on graduation, people get jobs and people lose time and energy as the school year wraps up. This semester, though, we've seen growth overall in our small groups and at Large Group. This is unprecedented. I cannot recall a time in my 11 years at SSU, as a student or staff, that this has happened.

We've also seen six people come to faith this semester! One transfer student, *Stacey*, quickly stood up when I gave a call to faith at the end of one of our Large Group meetings. She said that she had known that God was real, but finally wanted to make the step of giving her life over to Him. Since making that decision, it has been a blessing to see her get more involved in the fellowship; she has been growing through her small group community and by connecting with some of the student leaders in our fellowship. **Please thank God for and pray for** *Stacey*.
