AND YOUR POINT IS.

I was entirely oblivious to the commotion I stirred up that day.

Have you ever told a story in order to make a point - then forgot to make the point? I did it last Sunday when I preached. I told a little story and a couple of you very kindly asked after the service if you had just missed the point or if, perhaps, there was no point.

I've certainly told plenty of stories with no point, but this time, I did have a point - I even said I had a point, but no point was forthcoming. I leapt somewhere else. You couldn't even connect the "dots," I didn't give you any dots.

So, here – again -- is the little story, this time with a point (I think):

When I was young I ran away from home. I didn't journey far; you see I had little bitty legs and probably a very wet diaper. All the same I managed to toddle myself over to the next cul-de-sac where my friend "Ellen" lived . When I got to her front door I made enough noise for her mom, (who was my mom's best friend) to come check it out. I was rather short at the time, but luckily, her eye caught the plump little diaper-clad two-year old sitting on her doorstep.

She scooped me up and raced back to our house, figuring something catastrophic had happened to my mom. Something had -- her baby boy was missing, and she was frantically tearing up the house in search of him! Later I would hear of the absolute relief she felt when her friend carried me into the house.

So here's my point:

I was entirely oblivious to the commotion I stirred up that day. I was totally unaware of the search that had ensued over my disappearance. I had absolutely no idea of the stress I had created for my mom or her friend. I truly had no sense of the concern and love being demonstrated on my behalf. Toddlers don't understand, can't conceive, the nearly absolute sacrificial love a parent has for them. This, of course, doesn't lessen the reality of that love. Makes me wonder how much more the children of God fail to comprehend and live in the truth of their heavenly Father's love.

We recently entered the Season of Lent, sometimes referred to as our journey to the Cross and resurrection. Christians traditionally commemorate this 40 day period before Easter as a time of remembering the suffering and sacrifice of Christ for the sake of world. As we honestly open ourselves, we are drawn into, confronted by, the why and the what-for of the self-giving love of God. Lent shows us how not to be oblivious and unaware of our Lord's great love for us.

We are aided in this intentional journey to the Cross by Jesus' Beatitudes (Matthew 5:1-10). These blessings come, the announcement of the availability of the kingdom of Heaven, to all sorts of surprising people; surprising because for all kinds of reasons they considered themselves not "blessable." May these blessings truly have their way with us, speaking more clearly and more deeply than ever before about his favor and grace!

The fear of uncertainty ... squeezes out any hope we might have.

A s my feet dangled over the edge of the "Soarin' over California" ride in Disneyland's California Adventure, I felt like I was at least 500 feet in the air. My head knew I was on a ride, strapped into a seat, and only a few feet from the ground...but my heart still pounded as if I might be much higher, dangling in nowhere, and on the verge of danger. This was supposed to be fun! I wasn't experiencing fun...yet!

Trembling from my fear of heights and holding on tight, I shook my head and saw the amazing scenery of California fly in front of me and below my feet...trying to remember I was watching a film on a screen. "I am OK...and I am safe...don't worry" I told myself.

My Disneyland experience reminds me of the fears that many of us face, that threaten to steal our reason and rob us of our joy. We face difficult questions such as, "How do I raise my children as a single parent?" or "Why do I feel like a failure so much of the time?" or "What will my next job be and when will I find it?" The fear of uncertainty, caused by questions like these, weighs us down and squeezes out any hope we might have.

Mark 5:25-34 describes a remarkable woman who didn't lose hope. She had an incurable illness and tried one desperate remedy after another, all of which made her feel worse. Then she

put her hope in Jesus, "for she thought, 'If I just touch His garments, I will get well" (Mark 5:28). Seeing Jesus walking through a busy crowd, she went up to Him and touched His robe. Immediately, she was healed.

Jesus said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace and be healed of your affliction" (Mark 5:34).

Just as this woman went to Jesus for healing, we too, (both men and women) can go to Him for healing. Is fear taking away your joy? Do you face challenges that seem to separate you from the One who can help you find contentment? Don't allow fear or challenges to get in the way of coming to the Great Physician to find peace. If you find yourself facing unstable times, don't let these issues weigh you down and rob you of your joy.

I pray that you will seek the One who can help you find firm footing. In the end, I was glad I rode Soarin' over California. In fact, I did it twice! But don't ask me to ride a roller coaster...thank you very much!

THE HURT LOCKER

Is he taking the risks he takes for himself, or for others?

Just prior to the beginning of the war in Iraq (the 21st century one) I was working behind the hotel front desk when a group of guests (who had obviously enjoyed their wine) were discussing that topic loudly. They were in agreement on the proper policy and on the fact that anyone that believed otherwise was either stupid or evil, but they left room for the possibility that some people on the opposing side might be both.

As someone who was, apparently, stupid or evil or both, I was tempted to voice an opposing position. But as an employee, I knew that entering that conversation wouldn't be wise. Besides, I prefer to avoid conflict.

That topic of conversation continues to be, oh, what is the phrase... a minefield. Some people thrive on diving into such arguments and find a fierce debate stimulating. Some find any disagreement unpleasant and ulcer inspiring. It's a personality thing.

"The Hurt Locker" is about a man who is looking for more danger than can be found in the thrill of debate. Jeremy Renner plays Staff Sergeant William James, the leader of an elite American Army bomb squad in Iraq circa 2004. James develops an addiction to the dangers of his job.

On assignments to disarm IEDs

and other explosive devices, he takes increasing risks. He takes off the protective gear assigned him. He continues to work on bombs as the clock has been ticking too long. He risks not just his own life, but the lives of his fellow soldiers.

And yet, he can argue all the time that the risks he takes are to protect the lives and property of others, fellow soldiers and the Iraqi civilians. So is he taking the risks he takes for himself, or for others?

In one scene in the film, one of James' barracks mates finds an odd box under a bed. It is full of fuses and detonators and timers. (It is the "hurt locker" of the film's title.) James explains that the objects are souvenirs from bombs. He remembers the time and place where he acquired each one. He says they remind him that he is alive.

Many of us have hurt lockers. Our most vivid memories are those times when we were in peril. The Apostle Paul certainly had one. In II Corinthians 11 he wrote:

²³Are they servants of Christ? (I am out of my mind to talk like this.) I am more. I have worked much harder, been in prison more frequently, been flogged more severely, and been exposed to death again and again. ²⁴Five times I received from the Jews the forty lashes minus one. ²⁵Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was stoned, three times I was shipwrecked, I spent a night and a day in the open sea, ²⁶I have been constantly on the move. I have been in danger from rivers, in danger from bandits, in danger from my own countrymen, in danger from Gentiles; in danger in the city, in danger in the country, in danger at sea; and in danger from false brothers. ²⁷I have labored and toiled and have often gone without sleep; I have known hunger and thirst and have often gone without food; I have been cold and naked. ²⁸Besides everything else, I face daily the pressure of my concern for all the churches. ²⁹Who is weak, and I do not feel weak? Who is led into sin, and I do not inwardly burn? ³⁰If I must boast, I will boast of the things that show my weakness.

But I don't think Paul put himself in danger for the adrenaline rush. Unlike James in the film, or the married person who has an affair to feel the thrill of the forbidden or someone who picks verbal or physical fights just to "feel something", Paul did what he did because God called him.

God doesn't call us to live a safe life. But the risks He calls us to take are for the good of others and His glory, not ours. No need to look for trouble. The Beatitudes in Matthew 5 assure us trouble will come. But if we trust in Him, He will give us the strength to face those troubles.

("The Hurt Locker" is nominated for Best Picture and could well win. It is rated R for violence and language. "Lost" fans should be warned about an unexpected Evangeline Lilly cameo.)


